LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Four years ago, the two co-founders of Charlotte Village Network set out to create an organization to serve older adults so they could remain in their homes as they age. That organization became a reality and now serves fourteen (14) older adults through the services of over 30 volunteers and a board of directors with elected officers. Our membership goal for next year is 50; in 2020 our goal is 150 members. The needs in Mecklenburg County are great, as indicated in the chart below.

VILLAGE TOPICS

The Village Concept


n recent years, older adults in communities in the United States have begun to gather together in their own neighborhoods to develop innovative, grassroots support peer organizations designed to help members age in place. The most widely known of these organizations is Beacon Hill Village, a consumer driven, membership association started in 2001 by a group of older adults Beacon living in the Hill neighborhood of Boston. Currently there are nearly 200 of these grassroots neighborhoodbased associations throughout the United States, and hundreds of others are in formation. In return for annual dues, members of these associations, many of which are known as "Villages," receive a variety of services and support (e.g., transportation, grocery shopping, referrals to care and other home discounted services. care coordination. volunteer opportunities, social and cultural events) specifically designed to

help them age in place and avoid readjusting to new surroundings at a time that comfort and community are paramount to US. These "Villages" have received substantial media attention, an online Village-to-Village network www.vtvnetwork.org has been established. and there ongoing research at more than a dozen universities or global corporations to define our future needs.

Existina Villages report an average of 154 members per organization, but the number varies widely and exceeds 400 members in dense urban areas. Villages predominantly individuals age 65 and older, who constitute more than 90% of the membership in these organizations. Less than 1% of Village members are age 49 and younger, and another 7% are between the ages of 50 and 64. Amona Villaae members. females outnumber males by two to one, a higher sex ratio than found in the U.S. population age 65 and older.
